

ABOUT US

Hope Through Healing Hands (HTHH) is a humanitarian organization whose mission is to promote an improved quality of life for citizens and communities around the world using health as a currency for peace.

Through the prism of health diplomacy, we envision a world where all individuals and families can obtain access to healthcare information, services, and support for the opportunity at a fuller life. Specifically, we seek sustainability through healthcare service and training.

This includes efforts for maternal, newborn, and child health; healthy timing and spacing of pregnancies; nutrition and food security; clean water; extreme poverty; emergency relief; and global disease such as HIV/AIDS, tuberculosis, and malaria. Strategically, we encourage global health partnerships by working hand-in-hand with leading organizations that best address these issues in developing nations.



WHAT WE DO

Since 2004 Hope Through Healing Hands has invested more than \$3.5 million in charities in both the United States and abroad. These investments have been in support of infrastructure, sustainable health development, education, healthcare, and emergency relief. This assistance has primarily focused on HIV/AIDS, but HTHH has also contributed to projects ranging from Hurricane Katrina relief to health education in Africa.

We sponsor young health professionals, including students, residents, and fellows, through our Frist Global Health Leaders program. These leaders travel to underserved areas around the world to provide healthcare in communities and clinical settings. The students spend up to a semester providing service to those in need and training community health workers.

We proudly lead the Tennessee Global Health Coalition, a robust network of over 70 nonprofit organizations, universities, and churches working toward better efficiency of programs through partnerships and support. We sponsor annual meetings to provide a deliberate social space for these global health leaders in our community to build relationships with one another.

We direct Faith-Based Coalitions to raise awareness and advocacy among grasstops leaders of faith to rethink the critical importance of U.S. leadership in global health and development. Our goal is to protect or increase U.S. governmental foreign assistance funding for a variety of these issues.

FRIST GLOBAL HEALTH LEADERS PROGRAM

Around the world there is a severe health workforce shortage, especially in Africa, which carries 24% of the burden of disease with 3% of the health workers.

Our Frist Global Health Leaders help fill the healthcare gap with service in rural clinics and training for community health workers. And in doing so, our work multiplies exponentially.

Our program provides unforgettable experiences and rich insights that will shape the choices and interests of these Frist Global Health Leaders during their future careers for decades to come.

Upon finalizing our commitment to the Clinton Global Initiative last year, we have continued to measure patients directly affected; fund students and residents; and review the community health workers and other staff that have been trained. We look forward to a new generation of leaders as we continue this robust program.

Moreover, to date, 67% of the Frist Global Health Leaders have been women. Among the students, 10% were medical, 10% were newly graduate-trained nurses, and 30% were in public health. 41% were residents. We have supported a variety of disciplines in the health professions including anesthesia, emergency medicine, medicine, nursing, pharmacy, physician assistant, public health, and surgery.

In 2017, our 9 Frist Global Health Leaders traveled to 4 countries and reported the following:

- Provided clinical healthcare for 988 patients
- Trained 403 community health workers
- Trained 70 staff workers
- Offered 32 different training courses

In 2013, Hope Through Healing Hands launched the Faith-Based Coalition for Healthy Mothers and Children Worldwide with support from the Bill & Melinda Gates Foundation to galvanize faith-based leaders and their constituencies around the issues of maternal, newborn, and child health (MNCH) with a special emphasis on the critical intervention of healthy timing and spacing of pregnancies (HTSP) to save lives.

Our work includes promoting awareness, education, and advocacy for these global health issues. We've chosen to focus on healthy timing and spacing of pregnancies, or international family planning, because if we can keep mothers and children healthy, we can help to combat extreme poverty, keep girls and children in schools, promote gender equality, prevent mother to child transmission of HIV/AIDS, and improve maternal and child health.

Our goal for the coalition is to educate and activate thought-leaders to discuss, debate, and advocate for these issues, saving the lives of millions of mothers and children through the protection

of U.S. governmental funding in foreign assistance, which currently constitutes less than 1% of our entire U.S. budget.







JUST THE FACTS


- 220+ million women worldwide want to know how to avoid their next pregnancy through HTSP education and resources, but they lack the access.
- Every year, complications from pregnancy and childbirth claim the lives of over 303,000 women and permanently disable many more; 99% of these deaths are in developing countries, and 80% are preventable.
- Young teenage girls, often married, between the ages of 10-15 are **five times more likely to die** from complications in pregnancy or childbirth than those over the age of 20.
- o If a woman spaces her pregnancies at least two years apart, the child is **twice as likely to survive** the newborn stage; mothers can breastfeed their children longer and devote more time and attention to their infants.
- Studies show that every \$1 spent on HTSP can save governments up to \$6 that could be spent on improving health, housing, water, and other public services.

THE FAITH-BASED COALITION FOR Global Nutrition

With support from the Eleanor Crook Foundation, Hope Through Healing Hands has launched a new campaign among faith leaders to galvanize interest, support, and advocacy for the issues of global nutrition.

Nutrition is one of the most overlooked areas in global health and development today. Though the U.S. has been a historic leader in engaging the global fight for infectious disease prevention, family planning, clean water, and maternal health and child survival, nutrition remains a fraction of the budget for foreign assistance. There is an urgent need for advocacy to focus attention on the critical need to eliminate hunger and malnutrition, particularly for mothers and their infants in the first 1,000 days of life.

The good news is that there are effective, efficient, and easy solutions. Supplementation is a successful intervention, including the addition of micronutrients, protein, iron, and folic acid. Improving breastfeeding practice so that infants get the most of their mothers' milk is another useful practice.

Such basic practices can save lives and improve futures. Nutrition is an investment in "grey matter infrastructure." For every \$1 invested, a country can get \$16 in return because of improved cognitive function translating into greater individual earning potential and community economic development.





JUST THE FACTS

- Nearly 1 in 3 people worldwide suffer from malnutrition. If this were a disease, we would call it a pandemic of biblical proportions. This hunger leads to the lifelong problems of chronic disease and weakened immune systems.
- For **1 in 4 children** around the world, malnutrition leads to stunting. Stunted growth during the formative years of childhood diminishes both cognitive and physical capacity for a lifetime, severely limiting learning in school and later earning potential.
- Due to poor nutrition, **over half a billion women** suffer from iron deficiency during pregnancy, often leading to anemia and even death. This deficiency also causes serious health problems for their infants.

ADVOCACY FOR THE GLOBAL FUND TO FIGHT AIDS, TB, AND MALARIA

In 2002, the United States joined with countries across the world to create the Global Fund, a 21st century public-private partnership designed to accelerate the end of AIDS, Tuberculosis (TB), and Malaria as epidemics. The Global Fund has helped achieve extraordinary progress in the fight against these deadly diseases. By challenging the status quo in how the world fights disease, the Global Fund represents an efficient and innovative model of U.S. health leadership and diplomacy. U.S. investment in global health represents one of the few areas that have won consistent, bipartisan American support, or produced such concrete economic, security and humanitarian gains for the U.S. and the world.

This year, HTHH joined Friends of the Global Fight to rally faith leaders in support of full funding for the Global Fund to Fight AIDS, Tuberculosis, and Malaria. Many U.S. faith leaders have been at the helm of supporting the funds to fight infectious disease worldwide for now almost two decades, but with the advent of the new Administration, we need to re-engage these leaders for a strong show of advocacy.

To date, the Global Fund partnership has:

- Saved 22 million lives
- Helped 11 million people access Antiretroviral (ARV) therapy
- Tested and treated 17.4 million people for TB
- Distributed **795 million** insecticide-treated bed nets
