

Maternal and Child Health Just the Facts:

- More than 303,000 women die annually from complications during pregnancy or childbirth.
- Of almost all deaths from complications of pregnancy or childbirth 99% occur in developing countries.
- In sub-Saharan Africa, a woman's maternal mortality risk is 1 in 38, compared to 1 in 3,700 in developed regions.
- Children who have lost their mothers are up to 10x more likely to die prematurely than those who have not.
- More than 220 million women around the world who want to avoid pregnancy do not have access to effective contraceptives or counseling services.

Maternal and Child Health

The Good News:

80% of all maternal deaths are preventable.

If we can save the life of a mother, we can likely save her child too.

Healthy Timing and Spacing of Pregnancy (HTSP) **CHANGES LIVES**



HTSP is an approach that helps women and couples make an informed decision about delaying first pregnancy until age 18, and timing and spacing subsequent pregnancies to secure the most positive outcomes for the mother, baby, family, and community.





Share of population below \$1.9 a day (2011 PPP)



The number of children who die before age 5 has been cut in half.







U.S. Global Health Funding as a Share of the Federal Budget, FY 2018 Request










Advocacy Flows in Global Health






Life expectancy is increasing as more money is spent on health

The arrows show the change for all countries in the world, from 1995 (earliest available data) to 2014 (latest available data). [Not all countries are labelled]

Total health expenditure is the sum of public and private health expenditures. It covers the provision of health services (preventive and curative), family planning activities, nutrition activities, and emergency aid designated for health but does not include provision of water and sanitation.





U.S. Funding for Global Maternal & Child Health (MCH) and Nutrition, FY 2006-FY 2018 Request





FY17 is based on funding provided in the "Consolidated Appropriations Act, 2017" (P.L. 115-31) and is a preliminary estimate. Some MCH and nutrition funding is determined at the agency level and is not yet known for FY17; for comparison purposes, these amounts are assumed to remain at prior year levels. UNICEF funding was not specified in the FY 2018 request.

While the FY18 Request eliminates funding for the FP/RH program under the GHP account, it does note in proposed legislative language that GHP funds could be used for "reproductive health activities, such as fistula repair, prevention and response to gender-based violence, and ending child marriage and female genital cutting or mutilation."
